UNVEILING OF A NEW ANTI RACISM WALL MURAL

International Wall, Falls Road, Belfast
Thursday 9 August 2012, 1pm

This mural is the result of a unique collaboration between the North's leading political cartoonist and Belfast's leading internationalist muralist, working with WARN and members of the Roma community and addresses the issue of anti Roma racism.

It has been drawn by Ian Knox, cartoonist. He has been the editorial

cartoonist for the Irish News since 1989 with his cartoons which unfailingly manage to hit the nail on the head. From 1996 until its recent demise he contributed the 'As I See It' feature to the BBC's Hearts and Minds programme.

It has been painted by Danny Devenney, who is without doubt the most prolific Irish muralist, having produced over 1500 murals in Belfast, Dublin, Galway, NY, Massachusetts, Liverpool, and elsewhere since the early 1970's. His murals have gained world wide recognition, covering as they do a vast range of historical, cultural, political and social issues.

The West Against Racism Network is a grassroots campaign based in West Belfast which campaigns against institutionalised racism and actively promotes an anti-racist culture in West Belfast.

Our main purpose is to campaign against state racism in all its forms, whether that be in relation to employment, accommodation, policing, immigration, service provision or any other area. We also actively promote an anti-racist culture in West Belfast, communicating the message that racism has no place in our community.

We engage in a range of activities including production of anti-racism awareness raising materials and resources such as wall murals, posters, booklets and charters, highlighting and responding collectively to racist incidents in West Belfast and challenging racist policies and practices.

In 2012 WARN produced a anti racism resource for community organisations working in West Belfast, 'Working Against Racism'. This booklet is aimed at assisting community organisations to develop an understanding of the historical and contemporary causes and processes of racism as well as supporting them to focus on what practical actions they can take to fight against racism.

WARN is currently undertaking research into the issues affecting members of minority ethnic communities working and/or living in West Belfast, including Travellers and Filipinos, whose experience sadly has not always been a positive one. Much of the racism experienced has 'gone under the radar', with members of minority ethnic communities often reluctant to highlight attacks or incidents. This research will help gain an accurate picture of the lives and experiences of people from minority ethnic communities in West Belfast and identify the steps needed to be taken by political and community leaders, statutory agencies, service providers and others to address these issues.
